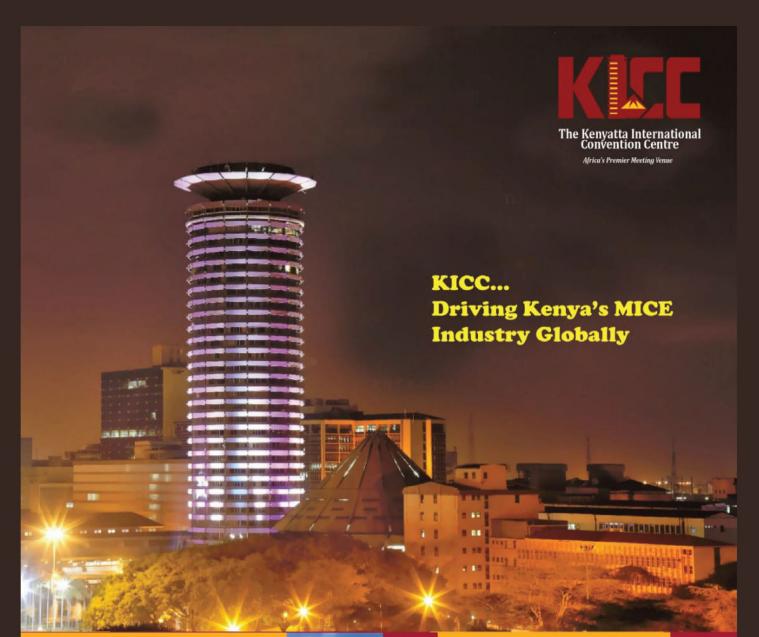

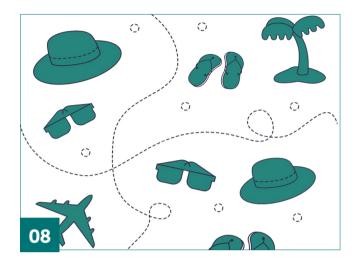

Bleisure

Bleisure is the practice of combining business travel with leisure activities. It involves extending a business trip to include time for personal exploration, relaxation, or enjoying the destination. It turns conferences and incentive programmes into opportunities for cultural immersion, relaxation, or family travel. This trend spotlight MICE destinations and boosts attendee satisfaction.

Sustainable venues & food

Sustainability has become a defining factor in venue and catering choices within the MICE sector, as organisations prioritise eco-conscious practices to align with global climate goals. Event planners are increasingly opting for green-certified venues that use renewable energy, efficient waste management systems, and eco-friendly infrastructure. On the catering side, plant-based menus, locally sourced ingredients, seasonal produce, and reduced single-use plastics are fast becoming the standard.



Personalisation

Participants now expect events to reflect their professional goals and personal preferences. Even details such as personalised event apps, dietary-specific catering, and interactive engagement tools are helping delegates feel valued and connected. By embracing personalisation, organisers boost satisfaction and participation and deliver higher ROI through deeper engagement and stronger relationship-building.

Wellness sessions

These are structured activities or programmes focused on improving a attendees overall well-being at events. They improve physical, mental, emotional, spiritual, and social health by combating conference fatigue. These sessions can include health coaching, fitness classes like yoga, mental health education, stress management techniques, and mindfulness practices, with the goal of promoting a balanced and healthy lifestyle for participants.

Community impact

Community impact is emerging as a powerful trend in the MICE sector, with events increasingly designed to leave a positive legacy beyond the boardroom. Organisers are weaving social responsibility into their programmes by incorporating activities such as tree planting, charity fundraisers, local school engagements, and volunteer projects. By involving delegates in initiatives that support host communities, such events not only create lasting social value but also deepen participant connection and purpose.

Diversity, Equity & Inclusion

Having MICE programmes that reflect gender balance, cultural diversity and inter-generational perspectives. Venues and event technologies should also be accessible to people living with disabilities. Such inclusivity strengthens a brand's credibility and fosters innovation by bringing varied voices and experiences to the table.

AI & digitalisation

Al and digitalisation are transforming MICE events by making them smarter, more personalised, and data-driven. Event organisers are using Al-powered \ tools for attendee matchmaking, agenda customisation, real-time language translation, and chatbots that enhance the participant experience. Digitalisation extends the event's reach through hybrid platforms, livestreaming, and on-demand content, ensuring inclusivity for both in-person and remote audiences. Advanced analytics now allow planners to track engagement, measure ROI, and refine future strategies with precision.

TRENDS IN THE MICE INDUSTRY

n 2018, the African MICE landscape was vibrant in potential yet fragmented in execution. While the Meetings, Incentives, Conferences, and Exhibitions industry thrived in pockets across the globe, Africa lacked a unified platform that could connect stakeholders, showcase destinations, and position the continent as a key player in the global business events space.

It was in this gap that Kezy Mukiri, the CEO of Zuri Events, saw both a challenge and an opportunity. As a woman with immense belief in Africa's capacity to host world class event, she envisioned a gathering that would do more than exchange business cards she saw a summit that would link policymakers, investors, and event professionals to a platform where impactful conversations are geared to inspire innovation and create partnerships powerful enough to advance the continent's economic narrative.

Accordingly, the Africa MICE Summit made its debut in 2018 in Nairobi, Kenya, with over 250 delegates drawn from across Africa and beyond. This inaugural summit brought together government representatives, global MICE experts, hotel owners, destination marketers, and event professionals for a two-day dialogue.

The discussions highlighted Africa's untapped potential, explored strategies for building sustainable destinations, and emphasised the power of collaboration in driving competitiveness: Under the theme "Shaping the Future of Africa's Business Events Industry". Beyond the plenary sessions, the 2018 edition also provided a unique platform for networking and cross-border partnerships. This set a tone for what has now become the region's flagship gathering for thought leadership and innovation in the MICE sector.

Now in its seventh year, the Africa MICE Summit stands as a continental hub for ideas, opportunities, and transformation. The 2025 edition will host stakeholders from over 25 countries, showcase innovations, feature destination pavilions, investment matchmaking, and celebrate sustainability through the Africa MICE Awards at the iconic Kenya Internationa Conference Centre (KICC) in Nairobi, Kenya. The summit will take place from 9th – 11th September 2025.

Beyond the panels and pavilions, the Summit is a living testament to what happens when a visionary leader dares to close a gap the world has learned to live with and instead, builds a bridge to a future no one thought possible. As we gather this year, we do so not just to talk about Africa's potential, rather we witness it in action and chart the course for the next decade of continental success.

Incentives emerge as the fastest orts to elevate MICE

he Meetings, Incentives, Conferences, and Exhibitions (MICE) industry is witnessing a significant shift with incentive travel emerging as the fastestgrowing segment globally. Meetings continue to top the list followed by conferences, exhibitions and incentive.

According to the Global Business Travel Association, corporate travel spend is projected to hit \$1.57 trillion in 2025, surpassing prepandemic highs. Within that rebound, incentives are taking the lead. The Incentive Travel Index 2024 reports continued growth through 2026, with planners committing higher budgets and expanding participant numbers despite rising costs.

This momentum is being fueled by a new wave of corporate strategies where companies are blending business objectives with employee well-being, creating experiences that go beyond leisure. In fact, the Society for Incentive Travel Excellence (SITE) notes that more than 60% of global companies now include incentive travel as a key part of their performance and loyalty strategies.

Africa and the world at large continue to elevate incentives as part of broader MICE growth strategies. Countries like South Africa, Kenya, Zambia, Uganda and Tanzania have stepped up investments in incentive-friendly offerings, combining safari experiences, luxury resorts, cultural immersion, and sustainable travel to attract global firms seeking unique destinations.

For instance, in Tanzania the government has prioritised MICE as a driver of tourism growth, with plans to establish a National Convention Bureau to coordinate promotion and bidding for international events. In parallel, the Tanzania Tourist Board is introducing MICE training masterclasses to upskill local professionals, ensuring service delivery matches global standards.

In Kenya, the government and private sector are actively promoting high-profile events like the Africa MICE Summit and international expos to showcase Kenya's competitiveness. Efforts are also being directed toward sustainability, digital innovation, and inclusivity, with wellness programs, green event practices, and hybrid conferencing becoming mainstream. Partnerships between KICC, Kenya Airways and Magical Kenya signature Experiences remain the centerpiece if this strategy.

The Government of Zambia has launched a policy framework recommending the establishment of a National Convention Bureau, simplified licensing processes, and the development of an International Convention Centre in Livingstone. Zambia has also secured rights to host three major African conferences in 2026, expected to attract over 2,000 delegates, further enhancing its credibility as a business events destination.

Globally, destinations such as Singapore, Dubai, and Barcelona have also redefined their incentive strategies by offering personalised, sustainable, and wellness-driven programmes. With corporations seeking memorable and responsible ways to engage employees, the demand for transformative experiences is pushing incentive travel into a central role in the MICE industry.

Uganda is stepping up its MICE ambitions via a formal national push. The Uganda Tourism Board (UTB) launched a five-year National Destination Marketing Strategy (NDMS 2024/25-2028/29) to target high-value meetings and aim for a top-five African MICE ranking by 2029.

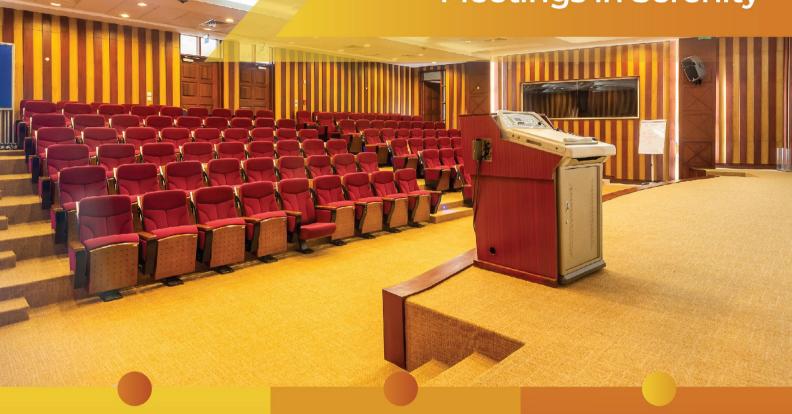
South Africa on the other hand, continues to expanding its global reach. The government is backing this growth through visa reforms, including digital systems for instant approvals, marketing campaigns and infrastructure investment. Additionally, South Africa has secured 53 international conferences between 2024 and 2029, expected to draw 24,000 delegates and inject millions into the economy. Its MICE industry emphasises sustainability, inclusivity, and innovation, ensuring the country remains a global player while retaining its leadership in Africa.

Globally, destinations such as Singapore, Dubai, and Barcelona have also redefined their incentive strategies by offering personalised, sustainable, and wellness-driven programmes. With corporations seeking memorable and responsible ways to engage employees, the demand for transformative experiences is pushing incentive travel into a central role in the MICE industry.

Experts believe that as the world navigates post-pandemic recovery, incentives will remain a key growth driver. The segment not only enhances employee morale but also promotes cross-cultural exchange and sustainable tourism. By combining immersive experiences with business objectives, incentive travel has proven to be a catalyst for both corporate productivity and destination competitiveness.

ICE events are no longer confined to four walls. Today's delegates crave stories, flavours, and connections that extend far beyond the closing session. The true impact of an event is felt when business seamlessly blends with culture - when delegates walk away with memories, not just meeting notes.

Imagine holding your breakout sessions not in conventional meeting rooms, but scattered across the vibrant corners of a city, each setting designed to inspire. Picture starting the day in a conference hall and ending it on a guided walk through heritage streets, savouring local cuisine, or listening to the rhythms of traditional music under the stars. Even more transformative are programmes where participants don't just observe, they engage: learning crafts from artisans, supporting community projects, or sharing meals in family-run kitchens. These immersive moments create bonds stronger than any icebreaker.

Over the course of the event, participants visited 35 unique venues, from tailoring shops and gold souks to spice markets, traditional houses, government offices, blacksmith workshops, museums, and even cargo dhows. At each location, we set up projectors, screens, and all necessary meeting amenities, seamlessly merging business with adventure.



The outcome was nothing short of remarkable. Delegates networked naturally, collaborated creatively, and, more importantly, immersed themselves in the authentic rhythm of Dubai.

Every detail was designed to spark delight and surprise, whether it was a police escort down bustling streets to make guests feel special, a private camel race, taking spouses to local homes to experience culture firsthand, or designing movie-themed sessions inspired by iconic films.

The lesson was clear: a meeting doesn't have to be confined to four walls. By blending creativity, culture, and a touch of the unexpected, we can transform ordinary conferences into once-in-a-lifetime experiences, events that delegates will remember long after the final presentation.

Designing such journeys is not merely about adding leisure, it is about transforming perspective. When delegates experience the soul of a destination, they return with renewed energy, enriched understanding, and stories worth sharing. Creating programmes with utmost creativity where one can proudly say, this is an experience money can't buy, a once-in-a-lifetime moment, a program that cannot be repeated twice; is the true key to lasting success in the MICE industry.

The Role of Regenerative Safaris in Curbing Species Extinction

Regeneration is an essential part of sustainability that enables longevity and sustenance. It restores ecosystems and empowers communities. In tourism, regenerative safaris are emerging as a way to leave destinations better than we found them. For Kenya, where wildlife and landscapes form the backbone of tourism, this approach is vital in the face of climate change, urbanization, and habitat loss.

id you know The Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change (IPCC) report found that 3% to 14% of species in terrestrial ecosystems are at risk of extinction with 1.5°C of warming. For tourism, especially in Africa where biodiversity is a core attraction, this is not just an environmental crisis, it's an industry-defining risk.

Species extinction means loss of natural heritage, fewer attractions, reducing travel motivations for Kenya and weaker tourism and community livelihoods. Tour operators have a unique opportunity to join conservation stakeholders in actively supporting conservation of species determined critically endangered. This can be through;

Funding conservation directly (e.g. reforestation, anti-poaching, habitat restoration)

This is channeling support to wildlife conservation initiative or organizations dedicated to specific flora or fauna by giving a percent of tour sales or as a periodic support.

Nomad Africa, 2024 Ecowarrior Awards Leading Tour Operator in Responsible Tourism Practices conserved 500 trees in the Kasigau Wildlife Sanctuary, a vital migration corridor in Tsavo National Park. Peaks and Safaris participate in Maanzoni Million Tree Challenge which restores the savannah ecosystem.

traveler interests and get buy in from the sector. They can also participate in events that feature a greening component. Real Africa Safaris, SawaSawa Africa and Kendirita Safaris among others, supported Ecotourism Kenya and Muguga Ecosystem Research Community Forest Association in a tree planting exercise in August 2025 that regrows Muguga Forest.

The Forest Challenge is an annual conservation event organized by the East African Wild Life Society (EAWLS), the Kenya Forest Service (KFS), and Kijabe Environment Volunteers (KENVO). It is a competitive, fun event designed to raise awareness and funds for forest conservation and reforestation efforts in Kenya's degraded water towers, like Kereita Forest. Among its supporters, are tour operators, who can consistently part take to contribute meaningfully.

Running an in-house initiative

Tour operators could go a step further by establishing their own conservation or community projects, from wildlife monitoring programs to community-based sanctuaries. These initiatives not only protect species but also inspire travelers to become long-term advocates for biodiversity. For instance, Community & Wildlife Conservation is an initiative by Sunworld Safaris.

Since 2020, they have supported community projects in health and education with 37 students sponsored, 504 textbooks distributed, an online learning platform and 9 medical camps held.

They have planted over 1000 trees and lessened through their antipoaching and bush meat trade preventive initiative. Eco adventures and Let's Go Travel are also







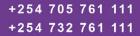

keen in supporting education and youth in their community empowerment initiatives, e.g. Eco Adventures' MaaChild initiative which provides sustainable secondary educational support for school-going kids in rural southern Kenya, Let's Go supported Rhino Charge 2024 and conducts youth skills development through their product watch, etc.

Engaging locals

Restorative activities should have locals engaged as equal partners and custodians of natural resources. When they have a stake; through employment, revenuesharing, cultural tourism enterprises, conservation partnerships, tourism becomes a force for restoring both people and nature.

at a session on Conservation Wins, was collaborating with local communities and empowering them to be stewards of conservation.

A regenerative safari might fund wildlife corridors and provide training and business opportunities for local guides. It could support women's cooperatives in safari zones, linking conservation with livelihoods. It could support community conservancies as it is a model where biodiversity protection and community empowerment go hand-in-hand.

As climate change accelerates biodiversity loss, regenerative safaris offer a path forward, one where the tourism industry becomes an active force in protecting species and ecosystems. The International Union for Conservation of Nature produces several "lists" as conservation tools, most notably the IUCN Red List of Threatened Species, which categorizes species based on their risk of extinction into groups like Critically Endangered, Endangered, and Vulnerable. This can be used as a guide to select which species to consider for conservation support.

In doing so, you could also be part of safeguarding not only the survival of wildlife but also a central part of African tourism. Explore more regenerative practices through Ecotourism Kenya members.

Green Infrastructure

n the Kenya Vision 2030, tourism is seen as a critical sector for achieving various policy goals: it is expected to contribute to economic growth, while empowering communities and creating job opportunities. It has done exactly that; Kenya is recognised as one of the great tourist attraction countries. For example in 2025 there were a flock of tourists witnessed during the wildebeest migration in the Mara. MICE venues have led to better industry relations as specialists are all brought under one roof to discuss challenges and solutions for the industry. MICE events provide participants with memorable experiences, fostering positive memories and promoting a sense of community and belonging.

However, the rapid growth of this industry poses significant challenges regarding the environmental impacts caused by MICE activities. Large-scale MICE activities generate significant carbon emissions due to high energy use and long-distance transport for thousands of participants. Many MICE activities also produce large amounts of waste, especially from using single-use plastic, food packaging, and paper. During our plastic-free July challenge, students highlighted religious and entertainment tourism, which are new perspectives in terms of conference events. It is evident how much waste is left behind after rallies and crusades. These environmental challenges underscore the importance of implementing sustainability policies when organizing events.

There is an urgent need for innovations that power green infrastructure and green meetings. Green meetings are a concept that aim to reduce the environmental impact of MICE activities through implementing sustainable practices and innovations which blend economic viability with ecological responsibility. We have no shortage of

innovations that have been implemented and can be replicated here in Kenya.

Eco-lodges like the Emboo River Camp in Maasai Mara and conferencing locations like Kenya International Conference Centre (KICC) are prime examples of how green infrastructure is reshaping the industry. They combine innovative architecture through renewable energy, water conservation systems, and community engagement, to create spaces are proving that tourism and sustainability can coexist. Moreover, these locations have taken up innovations like green mobility, maximising natural light and building using local materials. Sustainability is actually expensive.

Globally, companies are striving towards their Environmental, Social, and Governance (ESG) goals, and it is no different here. 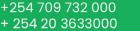

The climate imperative for

With the World Economic Forum projecting a five-year growth rate of nine percent Compound Annual Growth Rate between 2025 and 2030, the MICE industry is set for significant expansion. **DOMINIC WANJIRU** expounds.



his projected Compound Annual Growith Rate (CAGR) positions the sector as an important driver of tourism, trade, and investment in Africa. Yet, as the industry scales, it faces a critical gap, as there is still no clearly defined emission profile or agreed industryled set of reduction goals. This leaves the industry exposed, growing rapidly, but struggling to balance development with the urgent need for climate responsibility in the face of rising global scrutiny.

MICE, just like other sectors, is extremely vulnerable to the negative impacts of a worsening climate situation. Today, extreme weather events such as floods and heat waves not only damage the experience and infrastructure and threaten attendee safety but are also so disruptive that they have become a key determinant in the choice of venues.

While the industry is highly vulnerable to climate change, it is also a notable contributor to the crisis. Intense resource use, particularly energy and water consumption, combined with waste management challenges and transport-related emissions, are critical hotspots for the sector.

This dual reality underscores the paradox of the industry. As significant as MICE is, with its diversified traveler profile and role as a key driver of economic activity, it must also be considered a critical segment when addressing climate action.

However, it is important to note that climate action in MICE goes beyond phasing out single-use plastics in conference rooms or promoting sustainability efforts on billboards. Climate action should be intentional, extending to building adaptive capacity within its workforce

through flexible business models where resilience is recognised as a key skillset. More importantly, the industry must first understand its emission profile to properly inform action planning. This means collecting baseline data to identify emission sources, then, in line with global aspirations under the Paris Agreement in 2016 to achieve net zero by 2050, draft and implement actionable, attainable, and measurable decarbonisation strategies across operations, supply chains, and value chains.

A strategic approach like this, backed by a robust monitoring and evaluation framework, would create the rapid response capabilities needed to accelerate recovery and ensure long-term functionality after climate-related disruptions.

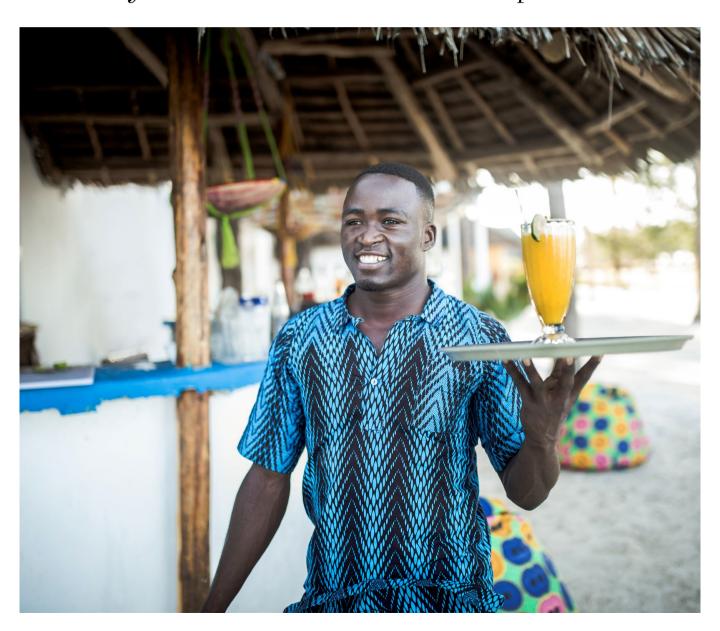

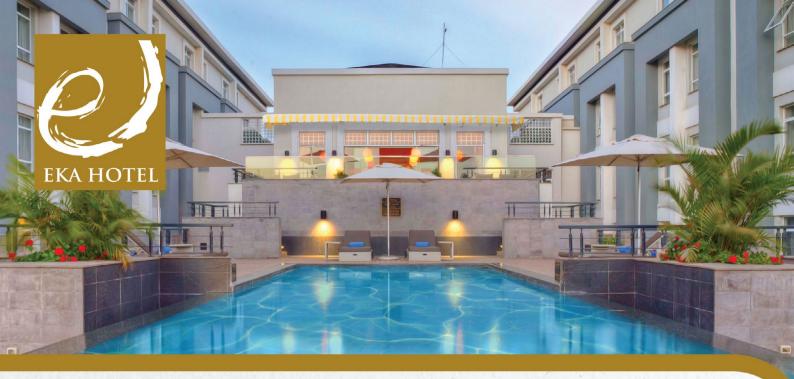

The state of association management in Africa

Associations in Africa play a critical role in continental development by setting professional standards and influencing policy. JEFFERS MIRUKA shares his reflections.



istorically, African associations like the African Association for Public Administration and Management (AAPAM) were created to build administrative capacity in post-colonial nations. At the national level, professional bodies like the Nigerian Bar Association have long provided self-regulation, reducing the burden on government oversight. However, the sector faces challenges exemplified by the African Union, which, despite a grand vision, has a 93% non-

implementation rate for its decisions between 2021 and 2023, showing a disconnect between strategy and on-the-ground impact. The sector's maturation is seen in the rise of specialised service providers, such as Association Management Companies (AMCs) like AFAMCO. This is further solidified by the formation of the African Society of Association Executives (AfSAE), a professional body for managers themselves, which fosters knowledge sharing and collaboration across the continent.

Financial sustainability: From dependency to diversification

Historically dependent on foreign aid, African associations are now strategically pursuing revenue diversification for resilience and autonomy. A 2020 CIPE survey found that while over 40% of revenue comes from membership fees, associations are actively raising income from diverse sources. This includes consulting services, as demonstrated by the Long-Distance Drivers and Conductors Association (LODDCA) in Kenya, affinity programmes, training, events with sponsorships, and social enterprise models. This shift is a strategic necessity for building financial resilience and long-term impact.

The technological imperative: Digital transformation

Africa's digital revolution has led to over 570 million Internet users, a significant increase since 2015. Yet, a considerable "uptake gap" exists, with only 22% of the population using mobile internet despite widespread network availability, largely due to high costs and a lack of digital skills. Associations are overcoming this by adopting specialised, localised software like Glue Up's AMS for Africa and scalable AI-powered CRM systems to manage interactions and overcome resource constraints. Al is moving beyond administrative tasks to strategic functions like data analysis and event personalised, crucial for staying relevant to members.

The regulatory and political environment

The legal landscape for associations in Africa is fragmented and complex, hindering cross-border operations. This is evident in South Africa's dual system of voluntary and registered non-profits. Governments are on a spectrum, with some creating enabling environments, such as Egypt's new law that simplifies NGO registration. Conversely, a

trend of restrictive "anti-NGO" measures, which includes burdensome registration and government interference, persists in many countries, posing a political challenge that associations must navigate.

Strategic challenges and recommendations

The sector faces internal challenges, including weaknesses in data collection and governance deficits like nepotism and corruption, which undermine institutional credibility and impact. There is also a persistent capacity constraint, creating a gap between ambitious goals and on-theground implementation. To address this, associations should prioritize data collection for evidence-based policies, invest in human capital through training programmes like CAE, AMI and YALI, foster intra-African collaboration to increase their collective voice, and embrace innovation by adapting business models and leveraging technology.

The future of association management in Africa

African association management is at a critical turning point, moving from external dependency to self-determination. The strategic shift toward financial diversification and digital transformation is building institutional autonomy and resilience. While challenges remain in the regulatory environment and internal governance, the sector is well-positioned for future success by investing in human capital, fostering collaboration, and embracing innovation. This evolution will allow African associations to not only lead their fields but also offer a new model for professional communities globally.

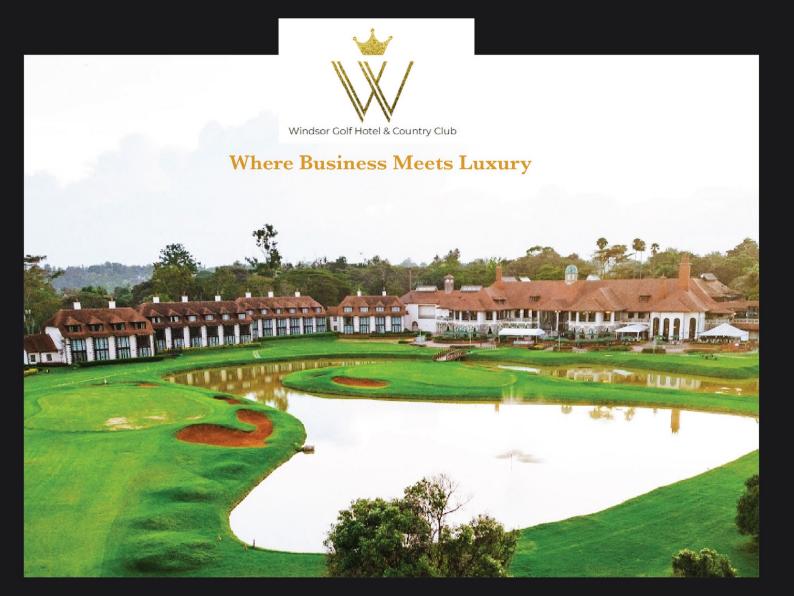

n Africa, the MICE sector has gained increasing attention as governments, associations, and private sector players recognise its role in driving economic diversification and positioning destinations as hubs of innovation. Yet, as the industry matures, data management has emerged as the key differentiator between events that merely attract crowds and those that deliver measurable impact. With technology reshaping how events are planned and experienced, the ability to capture, manage, analyse, and apply data effectively is no longer optional—it is central to competitiveness in the global MICE marketplace.

This article explores the importance of data management in the MICE industry, the challenges faced particularly within the African context, emerging global trends, and the steps required to ensure Africa builds a data-driven MICE ecosystem capable of catalyzing trade and investment.

The growing importance of data in the MICE ecosystem

A mindset shift is needed—moving from seeing events as "hospitality showcases" to recognising them as data-rich platforms for business intelligence.

Africa's unique opportunity

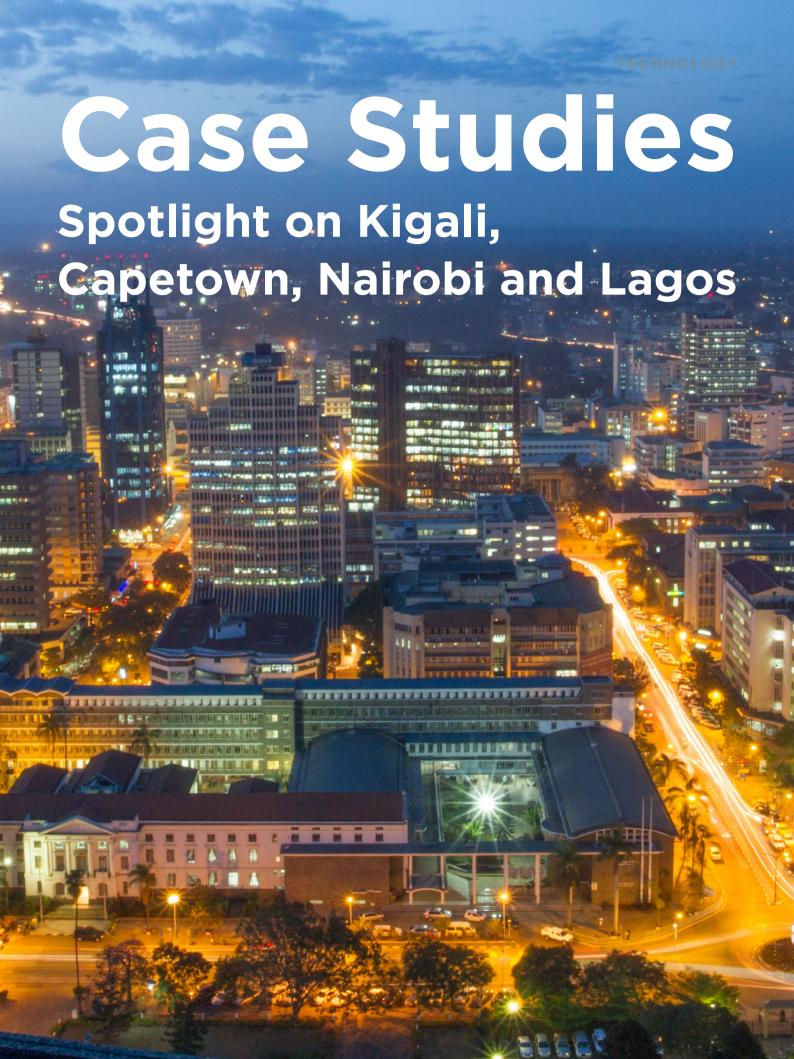
Africa can leapfrog into modern data management without legacy constraints. Just as mobile money disrupted finance, digital event technologies can allow the continent to set new benchmarks in MICE innovation.

The first step towards building a datadriven MICE ecosystem is capacity building. This can be achieved by training event professionals in analytics and compliance. Second is offering affordable tech by partnering with global firms and startups to provide scalable solutions. The other focus is policy alignment where data protection framework is harmonised across the continent. Next is industry collaboration where players share aggregated data to build benchmarks. Fifth is a shift in culture, where stakeholders move beyond headcounts to measuring real outcomes like deals, collaborations, and knowledge transfer. Finally, embracing public-private partnerships. Governments can incentivise technology adoption recognising the sector's wider economic impact.

The African MICE industry stands at a critical juncture. To compete globally, it must adopt data-driven strategies that demonstrate value, drive efficiency, and enable sustainable growth. As the global industry moves toward precision, personalisation, and sustainability, Africa has the chance to reimagine its events not just as gatherings, but as intelligence platforms for trade, investment, and transformation.

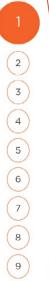

This is the promise of bleisure (business plus leisure), and it's transforming how destinations like Kenya design venues, agendas, and investment priorities.

enya closed 2024 with 2,394,376 international arrivals, a 14.6% increase from 2023, breaking previous records, according to the Tourism Sector Performance Report 2024 by the Tourism Research Institute. The World Travel & Tourism Council (WTTC) confirmed that the travel and tourism sector contributed approximately KSh 1.2 trillion to the economy in 2024, supporting about 1.7 million jobs. In comparison, the sector's contribution in 2023 was KSh 1 trillion with 1.55 million jobs, signaling rapid recovery. Within that growth, meetings, incentives, conferences, and exhibitions, also known as MICE, play a critical role. A validation workshop on Kenya's National MICE Strategy in 2025 highlighted that MICElinked visitors accounted for about 27% of

arrivals in 2024.

Globally, the bleisure travel market is estimated at around USD 430 billion in 2024, underscoring its strength and demand. Another key development took place in January 2024 with the introduction of the Electronic Travel Authorisation (eTA), which has streamlined entry into Kenya. This digital innovation significantly reduces friction at borders and positions Kenya as a more attractive destination for business travelers.

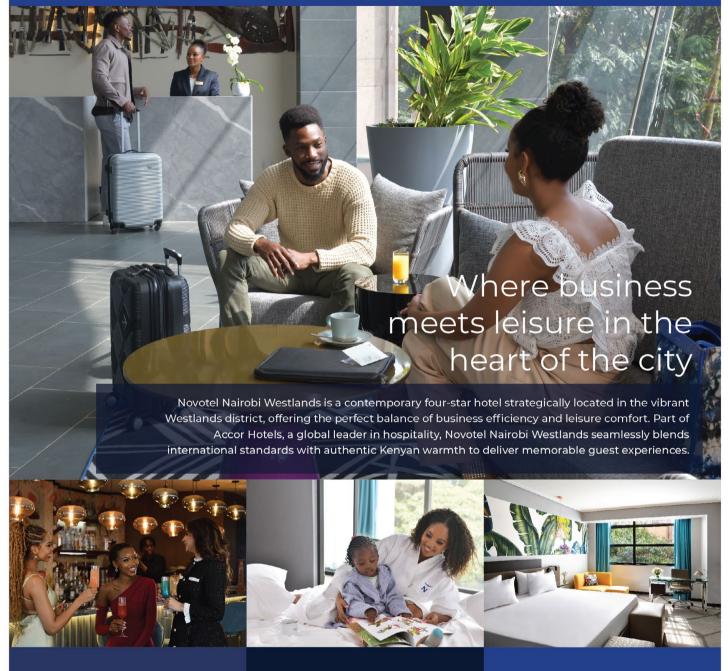
